Minutes MVCCA Environment and Recreation Committee Wednesday, May 1, 2019

The Presenters for the evening gave an overview of the property known as the Woodlawn Plantation. It is to be used as a mixed-use with for profit/non-profit entities to make full use of the property. The purpose is to activate the current spaces and historic buildings.

Arcadia Farms goal is to actively use the property in a sustainable way with farming and demonstrations at the Woodlawn House. They are currently training thirty military veterans to become farmers. They have found that our service personnel have exactly the right skill set: dedication to a project, patience to see it through and a willingness to work hard to achieve the objectives. In addition, they have on-site educational programs for school children and are working with the local schools for school gardens. 80% of their produce goes to the mobile markets and a farm stand is scheduled to open in July 2019. They are making use of solar power for the greenhouse, thus continuing the mission of sustainability.

The purpose of the overall project is to expand use of the Woodlawn property and are working towards a cultural center use to reclassify thru the zoning process. The buildings proposed incorporate: tree sensitive design-low profile, bird friendly design and enhanced stormwater management for the property.

There are seven areas of concentration:

- Historic Core: mansion and hilltop area: Amphitheatre proposed as well as outdoor restroom to serve special events.
- 2) Restaurant Core: adjacent to mansion-still on hilltop area: outdoor restaurant/outdoor bar/check-in area/outdoor kitchen. It will have a Pavilion area with removable cover and open approximately 100 nights a year.

- Special Events/Lodging Core: Repurpose existing buildings for Veteran Farmer Program, they have reduced the number of buildings previously requested.
- 4) Sharpe Barn Complex-Retail Core: Farmer's market, proposed nano brewery and farm café (breakfast/lunch), stables-wine/cider tasting, dairy-florist, and courtyard-gathering space and the Corn crib to be used as a seasonal pop-up market.
- 5) Barn and Greenhouse Complex Core: Veteran Farm Training Area; Barn-special events/educational facility, indoor field trips (to avoid weather issues causing cancellations), bath house, indoor coolers for kitchen. Will have tent platforms for housing.
- 6) Special Event and Program Lodging Core: Tent Pads and Pope Leihey House
- Site-wide trail Inspiration Core: Trail markers, wetland trails, foraging trails, farm trails and "smart" guides Suggestion by Ellen Young to create Geo-Fencing to curtail scooters.

The whole project is to create a cultural core to tie in the Mt. Vernon Estate/Grist Mill. There will be no new roads and accessibility with use of turnarounds. They will have golf carts for use to allow more visitors to move around. The goal is to limit the car use and make it a more walkable experience. It is a 123 acre site and it will make use of the tunnel under Rt. 1 to shuttle between the farm to the barn complex and for use by walkers/bikers.

The project has been approved by the Fairfax County Architectural Review Board.

<u>Presentation: Development of 6.3 acre Fenton Property Site,</u> (Joint with Transportation Committee)

The presentation can be viewed on the Planning & Zoning webpage at mvcca.org.

The Fenton property is located within the Penn Daw CBC. During the 2009-2010 Area Plan Review (APR), the MVCCA supported multi-family development at this site, along with a road through the property connecting Quander and Shields Ave.

The current Embark Plan is proposing a "livability spine", a road that connects through 7 properties, to create connectivity through the CBC and also connects Quander and Shields Ave.

The Fenton property plan proposes multi-family development, street grids, bike lanes and sidewalks, with 333 apartments, wrap around parking deck and access from Quander & Shields Ave through 2 properties. This is consistent with the MVCCA 2009 APR recommendation.

A proposal was made to write a letter to Supervisor Storck of the MVCCA's continued support for this plan.

TRANSPORTATION –

The MVCCA Transportation Committee met at 7:00 p.m. on the evening of May 6, 2019 in the Community Rooms, Mount Vernon Government Center at 2511 Parkers Lane. The meeting began as a joint meeting with the Planning and Zoning Committee. Participating in the meeting were: State Senator Scott Surovell; MVCCA Council Co-Chair Earl Flanagan; Tim Fenton of Penn Daw Properties; David DeCamp of D2Partners, LLC; David Proctor and André Stafford of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transportation Authority: Michael Felschow of FCDOT; and Katherine Ward former MVCCA Council Co-Chair. Transportation representatives of the following MVCCA citizens' associations were in attendance: Belle Haven Terrace, Belle View, Mason Hill, Montebello, Mount Vernon, Mount Zephyr, Spring Bank, Stratford Landing, Stratford on the Potomac Section IV, Sulgrave Manor, Waynewood, Wellington, Wellington Heights, Westgrove, Williamsburg Manor North, and Woodlawn Manor.

Planning and Zoning Chairman Gretchen Walzl called the joint meeting to order and introduced Tim Fenton and David DeCamp who presented an informational briefing on their proposed multifamily and townhouse redevelopment of 6.35 acres north east of the intersection of Richmond Highway and 6239 Shields Avenue. A part of this property includes the present Evolution Homes establishment. The main structures envisioned are five-story apartment houses with associated parking along the Richmond Highway. Tim Fenton, the owner is seeking changes to the Embark related grid of streets to better accommodate the sloping terrain of the property and improve access to Quander Road. While this project will be presented to the committee again in the future once plans are further developed, the owner would appreciate our support at this time to facilitate getting the needed plan changes. At Katherine Ward's suggestion, the committee voted (12 for versus 0 against) to send a letter to Supervisor Storck supporting the general concept of multifamily development of this property and the new access to Quander Road in order to encourage staff action on the request. In a separate vote, Planning and Zoning voted 9 to 1 for the letter.

Chairman Sitnik called the Transportation Committee to order and began with a number of announcements. Committee members who have news or have participated in meetings with transportation interest were requested to report on their experiences during the new business part of future meetings. The two speed boards that were to be made available from Supervisor Storck's office are not yet available. Our Transportation Committee resolution on possible fixes to congestion and dangerous conditions at the intersection of Richmond Highway and Fort Hunt Road and to the Beltway west and Woodrow Wilson Bridge was passed by the MVCCA General Council at its April 24 meeting.

Supervisors Storck and McKay have inserted undergrounding of utilities and communications language into the County budget. This includes the April 30, 2019 FY 2020 Budget Markup Process

and FY 2021 Budget Plan extending out to FY 2029. It recommends that staff continue to evaluate options for undergrounding as parts of projects in the County. Future Revitalization and Budget Committee meetings should be scheduled for Board of Supervisor discussion of these options.

Our Transportation Committee resolution on pedestrian underpasses at Dogue Creek and Little Hunting Creek, as a part of the Richmond Highway widening project, was voted down by the MVCCA General Council meeting on April 24. Gum Springs is strongly opposed to such an underpass at the Little Hunting Creek site. The Gum Springs community fears that there will be no way to reliably insure safety at that location. They also see two existing signalized pedestrian crossings as currently answering their needs to cross the Richmond Highway and are not confident that projections for future growth and development will materialize. Senator Surovell made a compelling argument that future needs require planning for responding to those future needs by including pedestrian facilities such as these underpasses in the widening planning. The committee decided to rewrite the failed resolution to specify construction of the Dogue Creek underpass and not the one at Little Hunting Creek where we would only request an enabling bridge design and needed right-of-way be set aside so future construction can be achieved if and when the local communities support its construction. Editorial corrections and other changes to capture the highlights of the discussion were also included. The vote was 9 to 2.

The a detailed update of our requested Mount Vernon Memorial Highway, Route 235 speed study has been received and posted on the Transportation web page at our May 6 Meeting date.

David Proctor and André Stafford of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transportation Authority presented a summary of Metro's Platform Improvement Project that will shut down Blue and Yellow line Metrorail service south of Reagan National Airport from Saturday, May 25th through Sunday, September 8th. They summarized the free shuttle bus services and added extra service to existing local bus routes that will help customers get around during the rail closure. The several free shuttles will connect Metro stations south of National Airport to Crystal City or the Pentagon. There will be additional busses added to existing lines through the area. For example, there will be additional AM and PM rush hour 11Y busses the full length of that route and 11Y north of Old Town will have service through the day. Fares on all existing lines will be unchanged. There will be free parking at closed Metrorail stations. For more detail visit [wmata.com/platforms]. The city of Alexandria and other affected jurisdictions will also take actions intended to compensate for changing traffic patterns due to the Metro closure. One that will seriously impact the Mount Vernon District is the changing of HOV rules through Old Town on Washington Street from HOV-2 to HOV-3 for a longer period of time and increased enforcement of the new rules.

The long awaited George Washington Memorial Parkway Safety Study is underway. This has been prompted by Congressman Beyer's office. Re-striping of the Parkway should be complete by 2020. The recent fatal accident on the Parkway is adding to the pressure for action. The Transportation Committee web site includes thoughts from Congressman Beyer, senator Surovell and Representative Krizek. The first week in June should see a stakeholders' meeting on Parkway safety with a public meeting during the week of June 10th.

We briefly discussed the issue of electrically powered bicycles and scooters on roads, trails and sidewalks. We will continue to watch these as safely statistics and initial experience develops.

The next Transportation Committee meeting will take place at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, June 3rd in the Community Rooms at the Mount Vernon Government Center on Parkers Lane. VDOT's Elizabeth Rivera will join us for an update presentation on Richmond Highway Design. For planning purposes, our Transportation Committee meeting schedule for the rest of the year is: July 8, No meeting in August, September 9, October 7, November 11 and December 2.

- April Board meeting was held Thursday, 25 April 2019, 7:30PM: at the Dunn Loring Center, Room 108 (Entrance 2), 2334 Gallows Road, Dunn Loring, VA, 22027. There was no quorum so no business decided but we did have lively discussions.
- April Federation Membership Meeting was held on 18 April, 2019: The meeting was called to order @7:30PM at the Fairfax County Government Center, Conference Room 7, 12000 Government Center Pkwy, Fairfax, VA 22035. Agenda included an interesting presentation and discussion on green electricity presented by Professor Jan Sklarew of George Mason University that demonstrated several local experiments that her graduate students are doing in generating Green Electricity. Centered on the production of electricity using micro turbines located directly inside storm water pipes and other contained piping hopefully producing enough electricity to provide limited electricity in off the grid areas of campus. Following the presentation there was a discussion on the Federation's Resolution on Robocalls.

- Whereas: Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT)
 proposes to build two Pedestrian Walkway Underpasses that
 may be constructed under the two new bridges that are to be
 built in conjunction with the widening of Richmond Highway at
 Dogue Creek and Little Hunting Creek, and;
- **2. Whereas:** These Pedestrian Walkway Underpasses are proposed to help keep our community connected, and;
- Whereas: The resulting Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)
 compliant uninterrupted sidewalk/trail will aid all people and
 cyclists to cross the greatly widen Richmond Highway without
 signal delay and safe from traffic, and;
- 4. Whereas: The Pedestrian Walkway Underpass will give Police and Emergency Responders easy and open access to the otherwise concealed and difficult to access underside of the bridges and roadway, and;
- **5. Whereas:** VDOT has asked for citizen input and comment, and;
- 6. Whereas: The MVCCA Transportation Committee discussed this matter at length and would like to share its ideas for ensuring a great end product, and;
- Whereas: The MVCCA General Council supports the construction of the proposed Dogue Creek Pedestrian Walkway Underpass.
- A. Therefore be it resolved: Pedestrian Walkway Underpasses must be Safe and Secure and should have 24 hour security devices and protocols (cameras, panic buttons, emergency alarms), and;
- B. Therefore be it further resolve: Pedestrian Walkway Underpasses must be Pedestrian friendly, inviting, well maintained, and esthetically pleasing in order for them to be fully utilized and safe, and;

C. Therefore be it finally resolved: We urge our Supervisor Dan Storck to actively support the building of the VDOT proposed Pedestrian Walkway Underpass at Dogue Creek and support the design and dedication of the required right of way at Little Hunting Creek so future construction can be achieved if and when the local communities supports its construction.
