EDUCATION -

The Education Committee met at 8pm, June 5, 2019, in the Parent Resource Center (moved from the library due to testing) of Whitman Middle School. Associations represented were: Mason Hill, Newington Forest and Collingwood Springs.

The Chair presented an overview of the new school accreditation plan (SOA) recently adopted by the Virginia Board of Education, cautioning that because the new SOA is quite complex and not yet fully implemented, the full import may take some time to be realized. In general, accreditation status will be based on performance on a set of "indicators", as discussed below.

At the base, SOA indicators continue to be heavily based on performance on the Standards of Learning (SOL) exams: indicators include combined English achievement (reading and writing, Mathematics achievement and Science achievement and also the achievement gap indicators for Math and English. However, the new SOA has dropped Social Studies achievement as an indicator but retains the Graduation and Completion Index (GCI) for high schools. It adds as indicators evaluation of gaps in English achievement and Math achievement among reporting groups, chronic absentee rates, and dropout rate (HS only). An indicator entitled "College, Career and Civic Readiness" is in development for 2021-2022 and may include in some way the eliminated Social Studies indicator but the parameters and rubrics are not yet known.

The new SOA divides performance on each indicator into 3 categories: Level 1 (green) meaning indicator is at or above standards; Level 2 (yellow) indicator is near standard; Level 3 (red) indicator is below standard. The standards vary by indicator, using SOL pass rates for the academic indicators but adding the middle ground (yellow) for scores close to the required rate. As part of an effort to recognize progress, schools can move up a level by reducing the failure rate by 10% (R10) ie an indicator which numerically is level 3 can be rated level 2 if it meets the improvement D10 test.

The SOA also sets levels for the non-academic indicators: for example, for the attendance indicator, level 1 is 15% or fewer chronically absent; level 2 16-24%; level 3 25% or more. However, for these non-academic indicators, particularly GCI and Dropout rate the calculations are complex and some .based on a cumulative 3 year basis.

A very significant change is the addition of the English and Math achievement gap indicators, which are essentially given equal importance to the whole school score, thus drawing attention to gaps among reporting groups which might otherwise be masked by overall school performance. The 7 reporting groups are: Asian, Black, Hispanic, White, Economically Disadvantaged, English Learners and Students with Disabilities. The scores of each reporting group are assigned a level as above; for the school to receive a level 1 on the gap indicator it must have no more than one level 2 reporting groups and no level 3; level 2 means two or more groups were level 3 and/or no more than one level 3 group; level 3 means two or more groups were level 3. Thus, for example, a school could be level 1 on the combined Math Achievement Indicator but a level 2 or even level 3 on the Math Gap indicator, and that would potentially affect accreditation status as discussed below.

Performance as demonstrated by the level achieved on all of the applicable indicators (some apply only to high schools) determine accreditation status. The accreditation designations are: Accredited (all indicators are level 1 or level 2); Accredited with Conditions (one or more indicators are level 3); Accreditation denied [an Accredited with Conditions school that fails to adopt and implement corrective plans with fidelity as determined by the Virginia Board of Education (VBOE)] The VBOE will also have some direct involvement in struggling schools such as requiring submission of school improvement plans to BOE for approval and providing staff to evaluate and provide direction. A decision on denial of accreditation is made by the VBOE, not strictly on performance indicators, which presumably would allow a school to plead its case before the "death penalty".

In the view of the Committee, the new SOA has both positives and negatives.

Looking at cumulative performance and improvement seems to be a better way to evaluate school performance. Some flexibility in addressing issues is also desirable and whether increased Commonwealth supervision is a positive or a negative remains to be seen. The VBOE could gain additional insight into issues faced by schools and presumably it would be difficult to blame a school for a VBOE staff plan that was ineffective. Outside views can also be helpful and improve dissemination of best practices.

Requiring all schools to pay attention to achievement gaps is desirable for County-wide improvement although the issue is certainly well known in our area and, while gaps persist, our schools strongly address the problems and our reporting groups often outperform County averages for their peers..

However, the SOA still does not address the problem of crossover in reporting groups. The multiplicative effect is particularly significant in high diversity/high poverty schools where it is especially likely that many children "belong" to multiple reporting groups. For example, an Hispanic student may also be economically disadvantaged, an English learner and have a learning disability; that one

child's SOL score thus affects the level of four reporting groups for both the achievement gap indicator and also affects the combined school math indicator level.

The Committee was particularly concerned with the high school GCI, absenteeism and dropout rate indicators which are likely to impact our schools and be the most difficult to address since social and economic conditions and family situations are arguably the strongest drivers. Certainly there are things schools can and should do to encourage students to be successful and connected to the school, to improve instruction, to identify and address student strengths and weaknesses, and to reach out to students and families immediately when problems arise.

However, all of these indicators are closely linked to each other (ie high absenteeism links to dropping out and/or not graduating on time) and to demographic conditions of poverty, language issues and large immigrant populations. The SOA thus seems to be delivering a triple whammy to schools with high diversity over social and economic problems schools have a limited ability to address. It may also be that schools will need to add staff (no doubt without compensation from the Commonwealth) to track down students who are absent, provide additional services and mentoring, or try to determine graduation/dropout status of students who have simply disappeared. On a more positive note, the nuclear option of "Accreditation Denied" seems to include some subjectivity which considers effort and perhaps demographics.

The Committee also questioned as a matter of principle the elimination of the social studies indicator; surely an informed and educated population is necessary to our democracy. While, as noted, the subject may be added to the proposed "College, career and civic readiness" indicator we currently have very little information on what factors will be included and how they will be assessed to assign indicator levels.

The Committee will likely have to have further meetings on the new SOA as the many pages of definitions and regulations are implemented and our schools become more familiar with the process. Some material which may be helpful to a general understanding will be posted to the Committee's website.

Some subjects the Committee will likely pursue in the fall include a followup with the "Equity" office and issues around special education and expansion of community schools.

The Committee focused on two items for the evening, the Arcadia/ National Trust Resolution and the updated information for the 7-11 off Lukens Lane/Rt. 1. The resolution for the Arcadia/National Trust is printed in the Record. The resolution is a board action to be ratified by the General Council on June 26, 2019. The Planning Commission date is June 25, 2019

Karen Pohorylo shared with the committee that the representatives for the 7-Eleven have met with county staff and made a few modifications. Included in those changes are a monument sign, which the committee feels is way too large for the space and their idea of a canopy roof only is in use for the entrance. The rest of the building is a flat roof and pedestrian in nature. Additionally, the company has decided to use the full space instead of leasing out to another entity. In addition, they are moving the store closer to Rt. 1 and moving the parking to the backside of the property as well as increase the number of plantings surrounding the property. The county asked for them to contribute to the Lukens Lane upgrades instead of undergrounding their utilities, which this committee and the MVCCA has advocated for, and the Countywide Green Initiatives that supports solar and alternative energy.

The committee has asked for the MVCCA Board to draft a letter to County Staff regarding disappointment in the implementation of the County Green Initiatives, as our Resolutions have asked for solar energy or alternative energy time again, with nothing being implemented. Same with the undergrounding of utilities or adding a development condition of funds to future undergrounding of utilities.

PUBLIC SAFETY

The Mount Vernon Council of Citizens' Association's Public Safety Committee meeting was held on Thursday, June 6, 2019 in the Mount Vernon Government Center. The meeting began at 7:34 PM with the following associations represented: Hollin Hills, Mason Hill (2 reps), Mount Vernon Civic, Potomac Valley-Riverbend, Stratford Landing, Stratford on the Potomac IV, and Waynewood. Speakers for the evening were representatives of the Fairfax County Police Department:

- Lieutenant Camille Stewart, Mount Vernon District Station Assistant Commander
- Master Police Officer Marvin Goodley, Mount Vernon District Station Crime Prevention Officer (CPO)

Introductions & Welcome

MPO Goodley gave a brief history

- Originally from New York and started out as a NY State Trooper, ~7 years.
- For last ~20 years, he has worked in the Mount Vernon District ("best place to work") as Patrol, School Resource Officer for West Potomac/Carl Sandburg/Bryant and in the Criminal Investigations Section for a couple of years as a detective doing everything except homicide.
- His current job is to assist in keeping our community safe. His door is always open and he's available to answer any questions.
- He's enjoying it so far. The last 6 months have been dealing more with the community then previously and it's taking a little getting used to.

Question/Answer (both LT Stewart and MPO Goodley)

Q: How is West Potomac High School? What's the crime level? A: WPHS is a big school laid out in a college campus style with 3 separate buildings so there's a lot of activity. There are about 2000 different personalities to work with and get back in line. It's a typical high school. Nothing out of the normal.

Q: How long have you been CPO?

A: In October of last year, when Monica Meeks was promoted to Sergeant, he moved into Community Liaison Office (CLO). Then in the spring, after MPO Bubba Urps transferred to West Springfield, he did both CLO and CPO. Now Private First Class Katie Treichel is taking over CLO. Wants to build bridges in the community, working with people and helping them. For instance, in the trailer park, there's a lack of trust. He wants to address issues and keep communication open, especially with the youth and underserved populations. He wants people to know him and develop relationships so that he's not a stranger.

Q: How are you being proactive instead of just responding to calls for service?

A: By driving around and talking with people so that over time they get used to him. Sponsor different events and invite the public so that they can talk in a non-crime related way.

Q: What events?

- A:
- Today, they did an ice cream social with a Colechester community

- June 17(?) meeting at the trailer park to get the Neighborhood Watch back up and running
- June 22 from 10 am to 2 pm Community Day at the MV district station with motorcycles, helicopter, K-9, many different officers, face painting, etc. (posted on Next Door)
- Attend association Community Days

Q: What do you do for Neighborhood Watch?

A: Neighborhood Watch in general has changed to a "What do you see?" model. So he facilitates the start of neighborhood watches, answers questions, shows a PowerPoint presentation, helps communities develop networks within the community like phone trees (names/numbers/emails) and social networks.

Q: What's happening with National Night Out (NNO) on August 6 for this year?

A: Still involved and posted details on Next Door including a link to sign up.

Q: What is NNO?

A: Way to interact with law enforcement through community events.

Q: What about Coffee with a Cop?

A: This is through CLO with PFC Katie Treichel. Check Twitter. There's an event coming up on June 12 at the Starbucks on Arlington Drive from 10 a.m. -2 p.m.

Q: There's been a lot of media coverage about the body discovered in the park and it being gang related?

A: Usually gangs beat up on each other or on someone with some association to a gang. Usually not a threat to the general public/ civilians. It appears this person was a target. Lately there is a larger police presence (foot patrols, drive-bys, gang unit) in that area because police want the public to feel safe.

Q: What's happening with the Motor Carrier Safety Unit? A: Numbers in unit not as high as in the past so the best "bang-forthe-buck" is out on the highways. They spend a lot of time on the Beltway. They have had some sting operations: recently on Richmond Highway, they stopped a truck that had a stolen dump loader from NC (as well as other violations). Reminded us that this is hard to do in neighborhoods because they need an area for trucks to pull over.

Q: What's the difference between CLO and CPO? A: While there is overlap, CLO is more schools, rec centers and working with the younger populations. CPO is more crime prevention and education.

Q: What do you think about the new Captain, Brian Ruck? A: Seems to be a good guy. Was SWAT for many years and has good tactics for safety. Was a Range instructor. Even spent 3-4 months in Mount Vernon as a Sergeant. Was possibly the School Liaison Unit Commander. Think he started/came from Mason District which is sort of similar to Mount Vernon. It is believed that Captain Ruck has around 20 years with Fairfax County Police.

Q: Is there a managerial philosophy for switching people so much? A: Not really. Promotions can set off a chain of reactions and then things tend to settle down again. Commanders rotate about ~18 months. Supervisors go where needed.

Q: There's concern among public that police are reading Next Door posts.

A: Marvin just posts. Usually no time for the police to actually read the posts.
