A Special Exception to permit a service station and quick-food service store was presented by Lynne Strobel. The service station would include six (6) fuel pumping stations located beneath a canopy structure. The proposed convenience store would be approximately 2,920 gross square feet and offer a variety of items, such as pre-packaged food and beverages, coffee and fresh food items.

Access to the subject property would be provided via a proposed right-in only access on Richmond Highway and a full movement across Old Richmond Highway. Nineteen (19) parking spaces are required and would be provided. Streetscape would be added consistent with the recommendations of the EMBARK Plan. The applicant intends to develop and enhance the parcel adjacent to the subject property which is currently a water retention pond owned by VDOT. A monument sign welcoming to North Gateway is also a possibility. It is unclear if the current structure would be utilized or demolished for this proposal

This presentation was for information only, no application has been filed. The committee let the applicant know this type of proposal has come before the MVCCA twice before and is not a desired application for the site. The Applicant/Owner stated that \$1.9M-\$2.0M was spent on the property acquisition and an additional \$3.0M would be spent on this proposal. The committee was not swayed by the amount spent to purchase, or the amount to be spent on this type of application for this site. Other possibilities were recommended by the committee such as, restaurant and retail. It was a concern for the committee that Old Richmond Highway would be utilized in this proposal as well.

The Mount Vernon Council of Citizens' Association's Public Safety Committee did not meet in July. The next meeting is scheduled to be held on Thursday, September 5, 2019 at 7:30 pm in the Mount Vernon Government Center.

- TRANSPORTATION ----

The MVCCA Transportation Committee met at 7:00 p.m. on the evening of July 8, 2019 in the Community Rooms, Mount Vernon Government Center at 2511 Parkers Lane. Participating in the meeting were: Delegate Paul Krizek, 44th District; MVCCA Council Co-Chair B. Lynn Pascoe; and VDOT representative Allison Richter. Transportation representatives of the following MVCCA citizens' associations were in attendance: Belle Haven, Belle View, Engleside, Hollin Hall, Mason Hill, Montebello, Mount Vernon, Mount Vernon Manor, New Gum Springs, Stratford Landing, Stratford on the Potomac Section IV, Waynewood, Wellington, Wellington Heights, Westgrove, Williamsburg Manor North, and Woodlawn Manor. Two interested citizens were also in attendance.

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Committee Reports

Chairman Sitnik called the joint meeting to order and read to us all a tribute in remembrance of long time Transportation Committee member Don Hamlin prepared by Joe Gililland.

Don's passing was very sudden and he had been in excellent health. Don's aorta burst while doing yard work in early June, and he passed in the Fairfax Hospital on June16th. Don's ashes were spread at St. Aidan's Church on Riverside Road on June 29th.

Don represented the Riverside Gardens Citizens' Association on the Transportation Committee for many years. Don was a very experienced and outspoken member of the Committee and, having grown up in the area, was able to provide a long-term view of the Mount Vernon District's transportation issues. Don rarely missed a local event and encouraged others to participate too. He spent most of his time doing community work. He was a good friend to many and a good neighbor.

Don was a 1971 graduate of Groveton High School. He worked in IT as a Navy civilian for over 25 years, mostly at the Navy Yard. Don enjoyed 12 years of retired life and was able to enjoy traveling across the USA. Unmarried and with no kids, Don had a ton of friends and was President of the Riverside Gardens Citizens' Association. He is missed already! We could use a lot more "Dons" in the area!

Chairman Sitnik requested that committee members who have news or have participated in other meetings with transportation interest report on their experiences during the new business part of future meetings. He announced that our revised pedestrian underpass resolution asking for a pedestrian underpass at Dogue Creek and design and right of way needed at Little Hunting Creek was passed at the May General Council meeting. The FCDOT Huntington Area Transportation Study (HATS) is still ongoing.

The Chairman then introduced Ms. Allison Richter of VDOT who gave a thorough presentation on projects and concerns that the MVCCA Transportation Committee has raised in the recent past. These include the Mount Vernon Memorial Highway Safety Study, lane improvements at the MVMH and Richmond Highway intersection, and traffic flow problems at the Fort Hunt Road and Richmond Highway intersection. She also responded to a number of committee member questions about repaving now going on east of Fort Hunt Road from Vernon View Drive to Arcturus and the impact of widening the right of way of Richmond Highway on neighboring communities.

The Mount Vernon Memorial Highway Safety Study was generated in response to one serious accident and neighborhood perceptions of safety failings of the highway. Ms. Richter related four recommendations of this study to date. The first was to reduce the speed limit from 45 mph to 40 mph between Cherry Tree and Old Mount Vernon Highway. Second was to install a 35 mph advisory speed

sign approaching the Old Mount Vernon Highway traffic light. Third was the addition of a "watch for turning vehicles" sign for traffic coming off of Richmond Highway near the Grist Mill. Fourth was working the proposal to install radar speed signs which would give the driver's speed at speed limit signs. Committee member comments included further lowering of speed limit below 45 mph, a no turn on red sign at Old Mount Vernon Highway and accompanying enforcement, and extending the green light at Old Mount Vernon Highway because the current timing is "trapping" school busses in that intersection. A further comment complained about busses idling in the tourist bus parking, but that was determined to be a police issue.

VDOT has settled on a candidate fix for excessive congestion of west bound traffic on the Mount Vernon Memorial Highway at the Richmond Highway where there are now two lanes heading south and one lane combining straight through traffic heading to Jeff Todd Way and traffic heading north on Richmond Highway. What VDOT wants to do is to take one of the two east bound lanes and make it an additional west bound land. A physical barrier would separate east and west bound lanes. This is possible because one of the current east bound lanes is now actually serving as an unneeded excessively long left turn lane. The resulting westbound configuration would be two lanes turning south, one straight ahead to Jeff Todd and one north on Richmond Highway. While there is no funding yet, VDOT feels this would alleviate congestion, and committee members present offered no objections.

Ms. Richter told us that better guidance would be provided to resolve the disorientation issue at the intersection of Richmond Highway and Fort Hunt Road for drivers continuing straight north who can't identify the appropriate lane on the opposite side of Richmond Highway. VDOT is awaiting paint crew availability. Once they do their painting and signage work, VDOT will come back to us for feedback on the results.

The Waynewood Citizens' Association representative reported about the status of the repaving now going on east of Fort Hunt Road from Vernon View Drive to Arcturus and asked about the status of Croton Drive from Wavnewood Boulevard to Darton Drive. Residents near that street had been told that that section of Croton would not be repaved this year. Ms. Richter related that that particular segment of Croton Drive was indeed being rescheduled for next year. The substrate of that section of pavement is in poor enough condition that the type of repaving being done this year would not be adequate to preserve that road's surface, and if VDOT tried to do it anyway with the machinery and materials on hand, the new pavement would start to fail before the year was out. So, repaving that part of Croton will be moved to next year's schedule and will be undertaken along with other jobs needing deeper and more extensive work. This same information was later confirmed by Brian Edwards, the project foreman. Neighbors might see workers taking core samples along Croton to confirm the exact subsurface situation. Otherwise, the repaving operation appears to be going well. The materials appear appropriate; the resulting

surfaces look good; the work is being done efficiently; and interference with traffic flow within the repaying area is minimal.

The Chairman reported that the Planning and Zoning Committee had received an information only presentation on a proposed development that would place a service station and convenience store at the location of the former Sunoco station at 5928 Richmond Highway just northeast of the Huntington intersection. While both P&Z and our Transportation Committee documented our opposition to a service station at this location because it is not in the Comprehensive Plan, conflicts with the "Northern Gateway" concept, and would increase traffic congestion at this location, our committee is concerned that our consistent opposition to such non-conforming development schemes is not being taken seriously by our political representatives.

The committee voted to support a generally more active posture including letter writing and ask the MVCCA Board to put into writing correspondence to our political representatives to ask for the political will and funding to support consistency in enforcing the planning decisions made to shape the future Richmond Highway corridor and other positions that have been or are adopted by the MVCCA General Council. The vote was 13 for and 1 against.

Again, we briefly discussed the issue of electrically powered bicycles and scooters on roads, trails and sidewalks. While none of our members expressed immediate concerns with these vehicles, safety concerns are manifesting themselves globally, and both the Virginia State government and local governments are undertaking regulatory actions. We will continue to watch these as safely statistics and initial experience develops.

Thanks to Congressman Beyer's intervention, the National Park Service is finally presenting a "listening session" to gather feedback about ways to improve George Washington Memorial Parkway safety from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Whitman Middle School on Parkers Lane on Thursday, July 11th. All are encouraged to attend and to submit insights into how to make the Parkway safer for all. Maximum attendance is solicited to demonstrate to the NPS and Congressman Beyer how much this community cares about our Parkway and ways to make it safer.

Committee members asked about the impact of the widening of Richmond Highway on adjacent communities and land owners as well as the configuration of bridges across Little Hunting Creek and Dogue Creek. VDOT will present a briefing on updated details of the impact on land parcels/lots of the widening of Richmond Highway to the MVCCA General Council meeting on Wednesday, July 24th at 7:00 p.m. in in the Community Rooms at the Mount Vernon Government Center. All are invited to attend but only Council members vote.

The next Transportation Committee meeting will take place at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, September 9th in the Community Rooms at the Mount Vernon Government Center on Parkers Lane. For planning

purposes, Transportation Committee meetings for the rest of the year will be on October 7, November 11 and December 2.

----- SFDC -

At the request of the MVCCA, SFDC passed a motion to send a letter of support for the construction of pedestrian underpasses at Little Hunting Creek and Dogue Creek, with special note on environmental design standards for crime prevention.

Two Board members attended the Supervisors' Revitalization Committee meeting. Utility undergrounding along Richmond Highway was discussed. The utility companies are inclined to underground at no cost, provided that someone else builds (and pays for) the ducts; the Board of Supervisors is divided on the need for undergrounding. SFDC has sent a letter in support of utility undergrounding, emphasizing the positive effect this would have on revitalization and economic growth.
