Supervisor's Report, by Nick Rinehart:

- It's continuing to be a challenge getting support for undergrounding, with cost the main concern.
- There will be a public hearing on December 6, on funding of Phase 1 of the Huntington Club redevelopment.
- The office is still looking into how the Evergreen Homes development got permission to locate driveway accesses in a turn lane on Ft Hunt Rd.
- The Infill Task Force is currently looking at stormwater and tree preservation issues.
- Supervisor Storck has contacted the NPS, and demanded that they get involved with the proposed USACE Flood Wall project.
- Modifications to the SSPA process were approved, and the new 2-year, County-wide period begins in October.
- Re zoning for the Old Mount Vernon HS was approved.
- The Manufactured Homes Task Force has finalized their recommendations, and their report will before the BOD by the end of the year.

MVCCA Education Meeting – September 7, 2022

6 members present Guest Speaker Evangeline Petrich Executive Principal, ESSER III Grant Administration

ESSER Funding streams

ESSER I II and III – also set aside grants for specific programs like after school middle school programs

ESSER I 21.7 M grant - CARES - those are the same thing became available since March 2020 and must be spent by Sept 2022

More targeted and restrictive – hourly funding to support students support and for PPE which was necessary at the start of the pandemic as there were no vaccines

Technology classroom cameras and increased bandwidth to deliver virtual instruction with start up money

STATUS – was reviewed in January to spend it down and there is a plan to spend it on PPE

ESSER II

84 M managed centrally – Spend by Sept 2023

Supported Summer school 2021 – teachers instructional supplies, etc

HVAC replacement and upgrades some schools were more extensive

Also looking at this and figuring out how to spend down these funds as well

Funding on one time costs as opposed to recurring costs -

ESSER III

188 M (total amount – first year was around 97 80 and then 12 in the last year) 29 different projects – some are one year, two year and 3 year

1 year project – ESOL staffing Project 28 Line item for 1M for 2022 it has been picked up in the operating fund standard of accreditation

Most goes to student wellness and academic intervention (close gaps)

Division goal is to make sure students are making progress – also to feel safe school plans are put on the FCPS website plans live now are from last spring. Schools revised their plans over summer and August which includes their revised spending. It goes through 2 approvals 209 school plans

Funds are allocated on enrollment and testing data – data was 2 years old Attendance rates behavior rates etc. so it was difficult to calculate the real need.

This year approach was refined – no single data measured, but on a school based allocation. Evidence based practiced and uses. Move the system from I think it is working to I know it is working.

Question: Evidence based practices – how are these being shared across the division and is someone at central figuring out how to deal with learning loss. ORSI charge is to get us to that point – XYZ have the most impact on reducing gaps – the reality to understand is there were gaps before the pandemic as well so how do we accelerate learning.

Research tells us that an adult that can work with small groups for targeted support works best

AD Math Recovery opportunity for students to accelerate learning

Billingham teacher development to learn ways of coding of words across K-12

Instructional services coordinator are providing that leadership for the school leaders

23 M for social emotional learning – school based allocations to hire social workers or counselors for address the student wellness needs Guidance documents message is these should not be one time things – needs to be part of a comprehensive wellness plans.

Question: Is there a way to break down the way money was spent specifically? When you access the school plan you will see the aggregate spending – such as hourly teacher or instructional supplies. Recognizing that we have to be responsible fiscal agents what controls are in place to ensure that we have some auditing procedures.

Question: Can you speak to the auditing process? There is an external audit and the office of auditor general. External auditor – Cherry Beckert also auditing FFX CO Also the need to update the public on what is going on. There is also a grant manager after the plans are formed.

Procurement threshold – ensuring that we are not creating an over-reliance on any particular thing – if we need to keep it and it is working, how can we can work it into the operating budget.

Progress monitoring – assigning students to what they are receiving – the system has to evolve since this is such a quick process – looking at the return on investment.

Reports are available from the Auditor General – first reporting structure at the SB audit committee. Then it becomes available to the public. Cherry Beckert is due around November.

The public doesn't understand where this money is going – what is being targeted and why? We would love to have this information amplified in an understandable format.

Mount Vernon area needs more counselors – ESSER funds could have been used for this. Many schools planned for hourly

support – retired teachers etc. Those staff are paid a higher hourly rate

Follow ups office of auditor general report ORSI report – The feedback from the reports are helping to improve the work. Jan 13 school board report.

Question: The need for spending on technology ramped up. The budget is hard to see specifics on technology spending – what are recurring costs? Is that data being captured?

There were ESSER categories of spending – the current amount is about 3% and software is about 4% hourly teacher 48%

Other school based academic – wellness and project 27 – coded monitor funding when we had the social distancing requirement. Feedback from principals showed that there was a need. It was only funded FY 22, not FY 23. Redirection can not exceed 100,000. COVID case managers are part of that amount SB voted to allocate that amount. This one is strictly per pupil.

Office of research and school improvement ORSI is tasked with studying and reporting what is working.

52 central positions funded – weighing long term vs. immediate need. Some positions may need to stay.

Collecting data to make that decision – those positions are posted as one year ESSER positions

All ESSER III funds must be spent by 2024.

Follow up Information from Evangaline Petrich:

- Answer to the question of \$32 million for 3 days of professional development (slide 10) from a <u>January 13 School Board meeting</u>. After reviewing that material, this \$32 million wasn't coming from ESSER. The presentation was Dr. Brabrand's <u>Proposed</u> FY 23 (Operating) Budget. Through the Budget process in the spring, this was reduced to 2 days of professional development and the School Board <u>approved 2 days of professional development on May 26</u>.
- Office of Auditor General (OAG) first <u>ESSER Continuous</u> <u>Monitoring Report</u> shared at the June 22 School Board Audit Committee and the approved <u>FY23 OAG Monitoring</u> <u>Plan</u> (ESSER description on page 11)

 - 2019 Potomac Riverkeeper files Notice of Intent to Sue against City for violations
 - Polycyclic Aromatic Hydrocarbons
 - Most are carcinogens
 - Alexandria has been doing this for nearly 50 years now
 - Want source of contamination to be addressed
 - Spent 10 million dollars but still an issue with no timeframe to address

There was a presentation regarding 5928 Richmond Highway by Nick Over of Potomac Development Group ("PDG"). PDG is a real estate development, investment and consulting firm based in Chantilly, VA who specialize in mixed-use projects and buildings. While Mr. Over was unable to divulge the name of his client he did inform the committee that they were a national brand.

PDG is planning an upscale and "amenitized" convenience store with "made-to-order" food for both on and off site consumption. The location would also have EV charging stations and outdoor seating arrangements. If the store is considered a convenience store, a special exception would be required.

The committee discussed issues with a retention pond behind the property, LEED certification, how long the lease would be for and access points to the location. Mr. Over said that he will come back to the committee with more details and elevations within the next 60 days.

PROPOSED MOUNT VERNON COUNCIL OF CITIZENS'

(MVCCA) E&R 2022-06

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF ADDRESSING THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS, ESPECIALLY COAL TAR, FROM THE CITY OF ALEXANDRIA'S MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEM [MS4]

WHEREAS, the release of materials from the MS4 system that contains toxic materials, including coal tar, that should not be released into the Potomac River and will impact downstream Mount Vernon communities;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the MVCCA urges the City of Alexandria to undertake the work needed to stop the uncontrolled release of toxic materials into the Potomac River immediately.

MOUNT VERNON COUNCIL OF CITIZENS' ASSOCIATIONS (MVCCA) RESOLUTION 2022–E&R-05

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF HOUSE BILL 739 ON LIVING SHORELINES AND COMMENT ON THE DRAFT WETLAND BOARD GUIDANCE

- WHEREAS, on January 26, and July 27, 2022 the MVCCA adopted resolutions in support of House Bill 739 on Living Shorelines, which supports grandfathering of existing shoreline stabilization structures to address the concerns of property owners with respect to the 2020 living shorelines law update.
- 2. WHEREAS, upon hearing concerns of property owners whose shoreline stabilization structures were installed in accordance with the laws in existence at the time of construction, Supervisor Storck requested that the Wetlands Board work with the Office of the County Attorney to revise the existing policy/guidance document on Living Shorelines to address multiple factors, and the August draft of the policy/guidance document stated that the Wetlands Board may consider these factors but provided no information as to how and when these factors would be considered
- 3. WHEREAS, the draft policy/guidance is inconsistent in its description of the jurisdiction of the Wetlands Board, omits reference to the 1984 Attorney General opinion[1] (which has been used to guide wetlands board decisions in tidal Virginia) and does not describe the Virginia Institute of Marine Sciences 2020 decision support tool, which states that a bulkhead in a residential canal in need of replacement should be replaced with a bulkhead^[2].
- 4. **WHEREAS**, comments by the various parties interpreting the 2020 law vary from "well maintained controls can continue to be maintained and repaired as needed" to "any new permit application will require a living shoreline unless best available science shows that living shorelines are not suitable," the latter comment differing from other state statues because it provides for no consideration of impacts to the property owner and can result in impacts to the property owner of well over \$100K.
- 5. WHEREAS, the August draft Wetlands Board Guidance fails to aid the applicant or guide the Wetlands Board in determining where living shorelines are not suitable and does not provide the clarity needed to address the concerns associated with the 2020 living shorelines legislation as it continues to deprive an applicant seeking to retain their existing sea wall or bulkhead of knowledge

about how they can comply, and, as such, it establishes a legal vulnerability for enacting arbitrary and capricious policy;

- 6. WHEREAS, in the absence of guidance to state where living shorelines are not suitable, there will be an expectation of employing living shorelines along all shorelines except for those that have been excluded from the requirement of this law, such as government properties, which include parks, various facilities and stormwater outflows.
- 7. **WHEREAS**, when property rights are acquired for the public good under the 5th and 14th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution, the property owner is compensated for an easement or outright purchase, but the 2020 law provides no compensation for the property owner and imposes significant costs and a loss of property value to the property owner.
- 8. **WHEREAS**, the Chesapeake Bay Agreement and associated documents signed by Virginia do not call for the level of creation of living shorelines that the 2020 law seeks.
- WHEREAS, the draft guidance and 2020 law provide for the taking of property without compensation, which is in violation of the 5th and 14th amendments to the U.S. Constitution.
- 10. WHEREAS, while the MVCCA is supportive of the appropriate use of living shorelines to create habitat and improve water quality, the MVCCA is concerned that the legal vulnerabilities and the unfair burden placed on private waterfront property owners by the 2020 law will alienate property owners and deter them from efforts to improve the environment, fuel legal battles, be inconsistent with the One Fairfax policy, and slow progress in supporting environmental causes.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the MVCCA concludes that the proposed Wetlands Board guidance creates legal vulnerabilities resulting from 1) an arbitrary and capricious policy and 2) takings without compensation, which is in violation of the 5th and 14th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the MVCCA finds that the guidance, and associated 2020 legislation, unreasonably place the burden of creating living shorelines on private property owners whose shoreline stabilization structures were constructed in accordance with the laws at the time of construction, which is in contrast to other environmental programs that either place responsibility for cleanup on polluting entities or share the responsibility for addressing environmental problems among the population through taxes that fund those programs.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the MVCCA requests that members of the Fairfax County delegation to the General Assembly provide a draft of legislation to be introduced during the next legislative session that reflects the changes outlined in House Bill 739 so that it will be reviewed by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors and included in the Board's legislative package.

[1] In 1984 Virginia Attorney General Gerald Baliles concluded "bulkheads are included within the word "facilities" in §3(h), and that the normal maintenance, repair or additions to a bulkhead would be permitted under that section if no further wetlands were covered." [2] Replace bulkhead with revetment landward of bulkhead. If navigation or infrastructure limits available space, replace bulkhead in the same alignment or landward. Enhance vegetation buffers where possible. See: https://cmap2.vims.edu/LivingShoreline/DecisionSupportTool/ShorelineDST.html

NEW ALEXANDRIA CITIZENS ASSOCIATION NEWSLETTER – August 2022

Background:

On June 28, 2022, NACA sent a letter to the National Park Service (NPS) asking for immediate changes to reduce the confusion and improve the safety at the Belle Haven intersection before someone gets killed. The letter also went to many of our local and national leaders. Almost immediately, Noah Simon, Rep Don Beyer's District Director, called the NACA Board and said that their office would take the lead going forward and assured us that they were committed to getting NPS to listen to our concerns and recommendations and to get them to take action to make this portion of the Parkway safer. Noah also wanted to expand the discussion to include the Belle View intersection.

Please note, that NPS will not commit to any changes at this meeting. They will listen to our suggestions and then look at what changes would most improve safety and are viable from an engineering perspective.

The focus of the meeting will be on near-term improvements that DO NOT include physical changes to the existing parkway, such as roundabouts or cutting into the median to create merge lanes. While these proposals are included in the National Park Service Safety Study and may happen in a few years, they all require extensive studies and additional funding so they are not

viable short-term fixes. We also know that increased enforcement would help, but the reality is that for now there is only one patrol person assigned to the Parkway from Old Towne Alexandria to the Mount Vernon Mansion. Finally, many think that speed cameras would be helpful. Don Beyer's office agrees and they are working to get some legislative changes that could make speed cameras a reality.

Here is what NACA suggested in our June letter (a copy of the complete letter is at the end of this newsletter): Note these suggestions could also apply to the Belle View intersection.

"There are three possible ways to reduce this confusion and improve the safety at the Belle Haven Road and Parkway intersection:

- 1) Go back to the previous configuration with traffic coming from and going to Belle Haven Road crossing in the median and not in the middle of the southbound lane of the Parkway which is what we have now.
- 2) Remove the "Left Turn Yield to Median Traffic" sign and make this a two-way stop which all drivers know means that they alternate.
- 3) Replace the Stop sign for traffic coming from the Parkway and turning onto Belle Haven with a Yield sign. Yes, people from Belle Haven might have to wait a little longer, but it would be clear who had the right of way."

In our letter, we also stressed the need to make it safer for cars to merge and stated:

"Finally, but equally important, regardless of the option selected, we must find an immediate solution to provide cars turning north onto the Parkway a safer way to merge into traffic. Cars turning north have extremely poor visibility and no acceleration lane as they merge into northbound Parkway traffic.... In the interim, we request that northbound Parkway traffic which is continuing on the Parkway in the area of the Belle Haven intersection be restricted to the right lane only. This would allow cars coming from Belle Haven Road to have a dedicated lane in which to safely merge onto the northbound Parkway. This could be accomplished effectively and at a relatively small cost by signage and bollards."

SUBJ: Belle Haven Road and Parkway Intersection is Dangerous - Request for Immediate Changes

Dear Superintendent Cuvelier:

I am writing on behalf of the New Alexandria community to request that you review the recent changes made to the Belle Haven Road and Parkway intersection which have made this intersection more dangerous than ever. This intersection is one of the primary ingress and egress routes for our New Alexandria neighborhood. Since the reconfiguration has been implemented, there have been several serious accidents. Many of our neighbors are now too scared to even use this intersection, so they use Fort Hunt and Route 1 rather than the Parkway to get in and out of our neighborhood.

We believe that the key to improving the safety of this intersection is to reduce the confusion that has been caused by the recent reconfiguration. Confusion, by definition, leads to accidents. Cars coming from Belle Haven Road have a Stop sign and an additional sign telling them "Left Turn Yield to Median Traffic." The problem arises when there are several cars turning from the northbound Parkway onto Belle Haven. If a car is waiting at Belle Haven, the signage says that they have to keep waiting until there are no more cars turning from the Parkway onto Belle Haven. So, they wait as the first car turning onto Belle Haven goes, and they wait as the second car moves forward to the Stop Line and comes to a complete stop and then goes. They keep waiting as the next car moves up and comes to a complete stop at the Stop Line before proceeding. At some point, even the drivers of the cars turning onto Belle Haven realize this isn't equitable and they motion or nod to let the car turning left from Belle Haven, who has been waiting and waiting, go ahead. At that point, everyone is hesitating or simultaneously proceeding since it is not at all clear who has the right of way. This lack of clarity has resulted in several serious accidents and causes additional backup on both Belle Haven Road and the Parkway.

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There are three possible ways to reduce this confusion and improve the safety at the Belle Haven Road and Parkway intersection:

- 1) Go back to the previous configuration with traffic coming from and going to Belle Haven Road crossing in the median and not in the middle of the southbound lane of the Parkway which is what we have now.
- 2) Remove the "Left Turn Yield to Median Traffic" sign and make this a two-way stop which all drivers know means that they alternate.
- 3) Replace the Stop sign for traffic coming from the Parkway and turning onto Belle Haven with a Yield sign. Yes, people from Belle Haven might have to wait a little longer, but it would be clear who had the right of way.

Finally, but equally important, regardless of the option selected, we must find an immediate solution to provide cars turning north onto the Parkway a safer way to merge into traffic. Cars turning north have extremely poor visibility and no acceleration lane as they merge into northbound Parkway traffic. The safety study recommends that NPS "Construct Channelization - Constructing channelization in the median will reduce conflicts with northbound left turns and eastbound left turns and provide an acceleration lane for eastbound left turns." Unfortunately, the study states that this recommendation is "midterm" and costs about \$350,000. We have also been told by Aaron LaRocca, NPS, that since this modification would require a change in the footprint, that various studies must be completed prior to proceeding. In the interim, we request that northbound Parkway traffic which is continuing on the Parkway in the area of the Belle Haven intersection be restricted to the right lane only. This would allow cars coming from Belle Haven Road to have a dedicated lane in which to safely merge onto the northbound Parkway. This could be accomplished effectively and at a relatively small cost by signage and bollards.

We respectfully urge you to do something immediately to make the intersection at Belle Haven Road and the Parkway safer before someone gets killed.
