Meeting called to order at 7:00 p.m.

Minutes from the January meeting were approved.

## **Treasurer's Report**

Bill presented the Treasurer's report, noting \$165 in income from membership dues and \$80 in expenditures, leaving \$11,584 in the bank.

January Treasurer's Report approved as published in *The Record*.

## **Membership**

We currently have 34 member organizations.

## **Committee Reports**

**Budget:** The Budget Town Hall with Supervisor Stork was scheduled for Monday, March 2nd, from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m., and the next Budget and Finance Committee meeting was set for Wednesday, March 4th, at 7:00 p.m. Teresa mentioned a joint committee meeting with the Education Committee on February 6th, where representatives from the Office of the Chief Financial Officer of Fairfax County Public Schools provided budget information.

**Public Safety and Transportation:** John announced two upcoming events: a tour of the Emergency Center and 911 Center on March 12th, and a meeting on March 9th to introduce the new transportation liaison.

**Education:** The meeting covered several updates and upcoming events. Katherine requested Peyton to send the Zoom link for an upcoming budget meeting, emphasizing the preference for Zoom over Teams due to accessibility issues. Teresa provided the link and clarified that it was for Microsoft Teams, not Zoom. A Riverwood community member raised a concern about data discrepancies, which Teresa agreed to follow up on.

**Environment and Recreation:** Scott presented a list of items for future consideration, including watershed plans, invasive management efforts, and stormwater management as part of the Richmond Highway corridor redevelopment.

**Stormwater:** Leo provided an update on stormwater issues, noting a new focus on Route 1 problems and collaboration with E&R, and he mentioned an upcoming meeting with Kim

on Wednesday. The revisioning committee also announced a remote meeting on March 16th.

## **Southeast Fairfax County Development Corporation (SFDC):**

The meeting covered several topics, including the spring economic outlook event scheduled for April 9th at Belle Haven Country Club, with Terry Clower and Rodney among the speakers. Ellen discussed a request for funding to install a screening banner on fencing around the old Alexandria Hotel, which VDOT is installing, and Peyton agreed to investigate potential funding from the supervisor's office.

**Planning and Zoning:** As published in *The Record*.

## **Co-Chair Time**

Judy emphasized the importance of attending Budget and Education meetings to help determine the Council's position on the county budget, particularly regarding education funding.

Scott raised concerns about the repaving of Fort Hunt Road, which could eliminate pedestrian and bike lanes, and Peyton offered to help address these concerns.

Katherine provided an update on the old nursery site, which will be developed into a new fire station and supportive housing complex, with construction completion planned for 2027. The county and developers have incorporated some of the committee's recommendations into the design.

## **Community Time**

Leo shared updates from the Holland Hall Village winter meeting, where representatives from Public Works and Environmental Services discussed the Paul Spring Branch stream renovation project. The construction is expected to begin in June 2027 and will take approximately two years to complete. The community is concerned about potential effects on local access points and traffic, and they are working with FCDOT and VDOT to address these issues. Leo also mentioned plans to request park-like amenities, such as paths and bridges, for the area.

## **Supervisor's Time**

The meeting covered several key topics, including the success of the 39th Annual Mount Vernon Town Meeting and the county executive's budget proposal, which includes no tax rate increase despite rising property values. Supervisor Storck discussed the need for more homeowner-owned housing and emphasized the importance of fixing existing buildings rather than building new ones. The meeting also touched on school funding, with the county allocating \$118 million but falling short of what was requested. A public meeting was announced for the Sherwood Hall stream restoration project, and updates were provided on the Commons at Mount Vernon development, expected to open in spring 2027. Finally,

the use of drones by the county’s public safety department was highlighted, showcasing their effectiveness in responding to emergency calls.

Supervisor Storck discussed the use of drones and Flock cameras in the Mount Vernon District, emphasizing their effectiveness in crime prevention and public safety. He explained the Connect Fairfax program, which allows residents to voluntarily integrate their home cameras with the police department’s real-time crime center. He clarified that FCPD has strict protocols and limitations on accessing and using camera data, including a 21-day retention period and prohibition of sharing with ICE without a court order. He also provided an update on the Mount Vernon Center visioning process and the Penn Daw fire station emergency shelter project at Beacon Hill. Leo inquired about potential tax rate reductions and parking lot changes at Huntington, while Supervisor Storck explained ongoing efforts to secure funding for these projects.

A community member from Mount Vernon Manor praised Storck for the recent town hall meeting, particularly for the interactive video format. She inquired about the status of uploading the town hall video to the district website, which Storck confirmed should be addressed the following day. The community member raised questions about the Unified Sanitary District proposal, which the Supervisor explained had been paused for further community engagement and clarification. Storck emphasized that the 5-year notice requirement for potential changes to the refuse system would only begin once the Board of Supervisors formally adopts the proposal. The community member also mentioned submitting a code compliance complaint regarding excessive noise from a Mobile gas station and requested the installation of bollards to address parking issues affecting her community’s entrance. Storck acknowledged these concerns and assured that Peyton would follow up on the parking enforcement and bollard installation matters.

Meeting adjourned at 8:08 p.m.

**MVCCA Budget & Finance Committee Meeting Minutes**

**March 4, 2026**

The committee met via Zoom at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 4. The meeting was led by Committee Chair Kimberly Shaw. Judy Harbeck, MVCCA Co-Chair, was also in attendance.

Committee members attending included Riverwood HOA, Huntington HOA, and Hollin Hall Village Citizens Association.

The attendees discussed the fiscal year 2027 advertised budget plan presented by the County Executive and the budget-related provisions of the budget resolution.

The next meeting is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on Monday, April 6, 2026, via Zoom.

**Public Safety/Transportation**

**MVCCA Public Safety & Transportation Committee Meeting Minutes**

**March 8, 2026**

The Public Safety & Transportation (PS&T) Committee met on March 8 to review transportation and safety issues affecting Mount Vernon communities, including traffic near INOVA Mount Vernon Hospital, aviation safety, neighborhood transportation concerns, and a query regarding support for proposed safety improvements along the George Washington Parkway.

Chair Lincoski convened the meeting at 7:00 p.m. Also present were Scott Taylor, MVCCA Co-Chair; William Kane, MVCCA Treasurer; and committee members from the following MVCCA associations: Belle View Condominium Owners Association, Grist Mill Woods Civic Association, Gum Springs Homeowners Organization, Huntington Community Association, Hollin Hall Village Citizens Association, Mason Hill Citizen’s Association, Montebello Condominium Unit Owners Association, Mount Vernon Civic Association, New Gum Springs Civic Association, Potomac Valley River Bend Civic Association, Spring Bank Community Association, Stratford Landing Citizens Association, Villamay Community Association, Waynewood Citizens’ Association, Wellington Civic Association, Williamsburg Manor North Community Association, and Westgrove Citizens Association.

The committee welcomed Ebadullah Ebadi, transportation aide from Supervisor Dan Storck’s office, who introduced himself and offered assistance coordinating with Fairfax County agencies.

Discussion focused on traffic safety at Sherwood Hall Lane and Holland Road, where residents reported increased congestion and near-miss incidents following new hospital wayfinding signage. Queenie Cox of the Gum Springs Homeowners Association raised concerns regarding increased congestion and safety risks related to a recently installed hospital wayfinding sign directing vehicles to INOVA Mount Vernon Hospital via Holland Road, an intersection without traffic signals.

## ----- Committee Reports -----

Members confirmed worsening conditions, particularly during evening hours. Mr. Ebadi will follow up with FCDOT regarding existing or updated traffic studies, and the committee will revisit the issue after reviewing additional information.

The committee also discussed aviation safety, with Mark Yonchak noting the absence of a clearly designated county office responsible for aviation-related impacts on residents. Mr. Yonchak also noted that helicopter traffic and airspace management remain concerns and recommended establishing a standing county point of contact or advisory structure.

Members supported exploring a more formal county role or point of contact.

Additional updates were provided on neighborhood transportation issues in the Hollin Hall area. Diane Frazier provided updates on visibility and safety at Fort Hunt Road and Wellington Road, speeding on Shenandoah Road, and sidewalk continuity and pedestrian safety along Fort Hunt Road. She also discussed her association's recent engagement with FCDOT. Upcoming county bike and pedestrian funding discussions were also mentioned.

Residents will continue coordinating with FCDOT on potential solutions.

The meeting concluded with discussion of a proposed George Washington Parkway safety project. The committee was asked whether it supported additional funding for proposed safety enhancements near Belle Haven Road and Belle View Blvd. along the George

Washington Memorial Parkway. This funding would support physical enhancements to the traffic safety improvements already initiated as part of the National Park Service's April 2021 GWMP Traffic and Safety Context Sensitive Solutions Assessment. These include improved channelization, enhanced road markings and signage, rumble/mumble strips, and a pedestrian hybrid beacon.

Committee members expressed concerns regarding potential unintended safety impacts due to lack of shoulders and sidewalks and the visual impact of the beacons and any possible negative impacts on traffic congestion. However, after a vote, the Committee was broadly in support of the measures.

Following the meeting, Committee members toured the Fairfax County 911 Center and Emergency Operations Center on March 12, 2026. The tour, which was informative and well-received by the members, highlighted the county's emergency services and showcased the interconnectedness of the county to neighboring jurisdictions and regional emergency management resources.

**MVCCA Stormwater Committee Meeting Summary**

**March 5, 2026**

The MVCCA Special Committee on Stormwater conducted a review of the proposed FY27 Fairfax County Budget element for *Fund 40100: Stormwater Services*.

The budget request follows the format of budget proposals from previous years in that it matches anticipated County Stormwater Fee revenues with proposed expenditures. The FY26 budget, passed by the Board of Supervisors in May 2025, established the fee at 3.25 cents per \$100.00 of assessed home value. The same rate is proposed for FY27.

The County Executive memorandum, dated April 24, 2024, estimated a cost of approximately \$600 million to mitigate stormwater issues, especially structural flooding problems, in the County. The memo estimated that, given the current fee revenue, addressing known stormwater flooding issues would take until the year 2094. Nevertheless, given the current fiscal climate, the proposed FY27 budget did not include an increase to the stormwater fee.

Although the Stormwater Committee supports an increase in funding to address stormwater flooding, there was no consensus that a fee increase would be considered by the Board of Supervisors (BoS). Given this, the Committee did not advocate for an increase during FY27 budget deliberations.

While examining the FY27 budget, an anomaly was noted in the revised FY26 budget. The BoS-approved FY26 budget set planned expenditures for Capital

Projects at \$77 million, but the revised FY26 budget indicates an expenditure of \$289 million. The reason for the increase and the projects it was used for were not itemized in the budget. A request for explanation of this element will be made to the Supervisor's office.

Finally, given the lack of a itemized project breakdown for either the FY26 revised budget or the FY27 proposed budget, we were unable to determine the status of the project to examine stormwater issues in the Wellington/ Tauxemont/Hollin Hall Village communities. County staff committed to conducting such a study during a meeting with the Committee in CY2023. Funding to conduct the study was included in the FY2026 budget. Nothing has been done to date. A status request will be forwarded to the Supervisor's office.

**MVCCA Education Committee Meeting Summary**

**March 5, 2026**

The MVCCA Education Committee met via Zoom at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 5, 2026.

The business of the meeting was to draft and approve the Education Committee inputs to the MVCCA Resolution on the county budget.

That was accomplished and no other business was conducted.

The next Committee meeting will be held virtually at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 2, 2026 via Zoom.

**Budget & Finance/Education/ Stormwater**

**BF-ED-SW-2026-1 Joint Resolution with respect to Fairfax County FY2027 Advertised Budget Plan**

WHEREAS, the Fairfax County Executive's FY2027 Advertised Budget Plan (County Budget), was released on February 17, 2026, projecting revenues of approximately \$6.0 billion, including approximately \$3.05 billion in support of Fairfax County Public Schools, representing 51.2% of the General Fund disbursements;

WHEREAS, continuing fiscal pressures including employee compensation, inflation in contracted services, and debt service obligations are noted, to preserve core services and maintain fiscal balance, the budget proposes modest revenue growth and selective reductions and position eliminations across County government;

WHEREAS the FY 2027 Advertised Budget includes \$3.05 billion in support for Fairfax County Public Schools, representing an increase of \$118.1 million over FY 2026, which is less than the School Board's requested increase of \$138.4 million and results in a shortfall of approximately \$20 million;

WHEREAS, the FY2027 Advertised Budget maintains the current real estate tax rate at \$1.1225 per \$100 of assessed value, tax bills will increase due to increased home valuations, with the average increase estimated at \$357 for residential property owners;

WHEREAS the County's Stormwater Fee of 3.25 cents per \$100 of assessed value does not adequately address stormwater and flooding mitigation requirements (see for example County Executive Memorandum, dated April 23, 2024);

WHEREAS FY2027 represents a transition year for Fairfax County's financial planning, including the first full fiscal year of revenue from the County's food and beverage (meals) tax and the start of a new Governor and General Assembly in Virginia, creating both uncertainty and an opportunity to position the County for more stable fiscal planning in future budgets;

WHEREAS a significant portion of the School Budget reflects collective bargaining agreements providing compensation increases for employees (approximately 93 percent of whom are school-based professional staff) in order to remain competitive with neighboring jurisdictions;

WHEREAS Virginia budget proposals include some additional funding for schools throughout the Commonwealth, but the details are not yet known and are unlikely to substantially address the funding failures highlighted in the 2023 Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC), which cost Fairfax taxpayers in excess of \$600M per year and keep Virginia school funding near the bottom of all US jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS the status of federal funding, which partially supports the cost of federal mandates regarding special education services, Title I schools staffing, and other requirements (previously \$168 million), is unclear due to ongoing federal uncertainty even as the underfunded mandates remain in place and the number of students eligible continues to increase;

WHEREAS the School Budget includes no new programs but is not able to provide for known needs such as middle

school sports expansion, accelerating maintenance needs, and lower class sizes;

WHEREAS the School Budget also includes unavoidable expenses such as contractual increases, increasing enrollment of students with higher educational needs, debt service, transfers for major infrastructure maintenance for aging systems, workers compensation, and insurance;

WHEREAS the School Budget's ability to make substantial system-wide reductions is limited because (1) the overwhelming preponderance of budget expenses is directly related to school-based staff salaries, (2) staffing levels and class sizes are subject to Commonwealth and U.S. regulation, and (3) schools must accept all students regardless of need or special education eligibility;

WHEREAS FCPS maintains its national reputation for excellence while keeping cost per pupil in the mid-range of surrounding jurisdictions and the lowest ratio of central management staff in the area (1.1 percent compared to 2-4 percent);

WHEREAS FCPS is long recognized by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors (BoS) as the single most important contributor to the economic health of the County, especially in uncertain times, and as its highest priority;

WHEREAS the BOS, the School Board (SB), and taxpayers face continued economic uncertainty that creates additional fiscal pressures while reinforcing the importance of sustaining strong investment in Fairfax County Public Schools;

WHEREAS residents of the Mount Vernon District and southern Fairfax County rely on County investments in public safety, human services, parks, libraries, transportation improvements, and environmental protection, and reductions in these areas can disproportionately affect communities along the Richmond Highway corridor and other parts of south county;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens Associations (MVCCA) supports adoption of the Fairfax County FY2027 Advertised Budget and requests serious consideration to reduce the proposed real estate tax rate to mitigate increases in resident's tax bill;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the MVCCA encourages the Board of Supervisors to close the remaining gap between the School Board request and the County Executive proposal using available discretionary funds or additional state funding;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that serious consideration should be given to address stormwater and flooding in the County;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the MVCCA urges the Board of Supervisors to maintain fiscal stability while ensuring transparent reporting on the collection and allocation of meals tax revenue and other revenue sources;

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the MVCCA stands ready to work with the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, the School Board, and County staff to support policies and budget decisions that maintain the County’s fiscal strength, sustain high-quality public education, support the well-being and quality of life of residents, and protect essential services for residents throughout the Mount Vernon District and Fairfax County.

**Resolution on the Proposed FY 2027 County Budget (MVCCA, E&R 2026-01)**

Whereas, the Environment and Recreation Committee (E&R) of the MVCCA reviews and comments on County environmental and recreation programs.

Whereas, E&R is concerned that the County Executive’s proposed FY 2027 budget will not adequately support the following areas:

1. Plan to restore funding to programs that have been impacted by HR1 and restore that funding when possible. The programs were outlined in John Morrill’s September 16 presentation to the Board of Supervisor’s Environmental committee. (see: [https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/boardofsupervisors/sites/boardofsupervisors/files/Assets/meeting%20materials/committees/2025/Agenda-Item-2\\_Federal-Energy-](https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/boardofsupervisors/sites/boardofsupervisors/files/Assets/meeting%20materials/committees/2025/Agenda-Item-2_Federal-Energy-)

[and-Climate-Shifts\\_A-1a.pdf](#)). The advertised 2027 budget of \$2,464,833 is less than the actual 2026 budget of \$2,805,995. This reduction in budget will make it ever harder to maintain the programs that are so important to climate change and resilience.

2. Support increases to the stormwater rate of \$0.0325 per \$100 of assessed value, which has not been increased in years. A modest increase of \$0.0025 is needed. This funding is needed to address flooding, meeting Municipals Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Permit requirements, and continue to address deteriorating stormwater infrastructure.
3. Increase fees for county trash to cover the cost of the services.
4. Terminate the leaf pile collection program. Terminating the service would require that residents bag their leaves as do the vast majority of county residents.
5. Given the recent experience with the Potomac Interceptor, it is critical that the county fund needed maintenance on sanitary sewer lines. The county is proposing to increase the sewer charge by 5.9% to \$9.88 per 1,000 gallons, which was based upon a comprehensive planning process for the county’s wastewater management system. We appreciate that the increase is also needed to maintain the county’s bond rating, which is critical to maintaining a lower interest rate.
6. The Park Authority continues to be underfunded. The proposed budget will result in a decrease of 2.5%, which means that the Park Authority Budget will not keep up with inflation. We appreciate the funding to support the zero waste program and some new park funding. Continuing to defer work is not sustainable in the long term.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Fairfax County Board adopt these recommendations.
