What is Emergency Management?







MITIGATION

- Assume and accept risk
- Control of risk
- Identify risk
- Prepare for the hazard

PREPAREDNESS

- Emergency Planning
- Exercises/Training/Outreach
- Inventory of Supplies
- EOC Maintenance
- Building Relationships

RESPONSE

- Manage Effective Response
- Manage Resource Usage
- EOC Activation/Coordination
- Warning System and Public Information
- Documentation

RECOVERY

- Damage Assessment
- · Debris Management/Clean Up
- Long Term Care
- Rebuilding of critical infrastructure
- Managing recovery process

Emergency Operations Center (EOC)

- ☐ Coordination and support with local first responders
- ☐ Coordination for State and Federal agencies
- Activated at various levels of staffing that is dependent on incident requirements
 - Monitoring
 - Partial Activation
 - Full Activation

- ♦ Flooding Flash, River, Coastal
- ♦ Tropical (Flooding/Winds)
- ♦ Severe Thunderstorms (Damaging Winds/Hail)
 - ♦ Derechos
- ♦ Tornadoes
- ♦ Heatwaves
- Winter Storms



Flooding/Flash Flooding

♦ During – TAKE ACTION:

- ♦ Get to Higher Ground
- ♦ Heed evacuation orders
- ♦ Practice electrical safety
- ♦ Avoid Flood Waters TADD

Before - PREPARE:

- ♦ #Have3Ways to get warning
- ♦ Know flood risk
- **⋄** Plan home location/Evac Location
 - ♦ Know what roads flood!
- ♦ Prepare home: Drains, gutters, sandbags
- ♦ FLOOD INSURANCE
- ♦ Paperwork Supplies ready (Waterproof)

♦ After - RECOVER:

- ♦ Avoid floodwaters
- Wait to re-enter flood area
- ♦ NEVER drive around barricade
- ♦ Let family know you're safe
- Start recovery process
 - We cannot muck your home
 - ♦ Claims Homeowners won't cover



Severe Thunderstorms/Derechos

♦ During – TAKE ACTION:

- ♦ Inside no windows lowest/interior
 - ♦ STURDY No sheds
- ♦ Bring pets inside too
- ♦ Building > Car > Outside

Before - PREPARE:

- ♦ #Have3Ways to receive warning
- **⋄** Choose shelter location/Practice
- ♦ Trim trees/branches; Bring objects inside
- Help neighbor

♦ After – RECOVER:

- ♦ Inform loved ones that you are safe
- ♦ Assess damages report them
 - **♦** Start insurance claims
 - Avoid down wires/Dangerous debris
- ♦ Help Neighbor
- ♦ Follow official information for recovery resources and directions
 - **♦ Family Assistance Centers**
 - ♦ Shelters (Temp)
 - **⋄** Debris pick-up instructions


Tornadoes

- **♦ During TAKE ACTION:**
 - **♦ TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY**
 - ♦ No windows/lowest level/interior
 - *** LEAVE MOBILE HOMES**
 - ♦ Building > Car > outside
 - ♦ If time, put shoes on
- **♦** Before PREPARE:
 - ♦ #Have3Ways to receive warning
 - **♦** Have shelter location/Practice
 - ♦ My Plan: 2 Plans
 - Consider safe rooms
 - **♦ Help Neighbor**
 - **The Supplies ready to go**

♦ After – RECOVER:

- ♦ Check self seek medical attention
- **⋄** Be careful in debris
- ♦ No candles
- **⋄** Assess damage and report
 - ♦ Local gov insurance
- Help neighbor
- **⋄** Stay tuned to info on recovery
 - **♦** Shelters
 - ♦ Individual Assistance
 - ♦ Debris Pick-Up
 - **Operation Operation Operation Operation Operat**

General Preparedness



Communications

- ♦ Different "rings" of communication:
 - ♦ Family
 - ♦ Work
 - ♦ School
 - ♦ Family Needs
 - ♦ Emergency



♦ Consider:

- ♦ Digital AND paper
- ♦ Text over call
- ♦ Out of state contacts
- ♦ Insurance contacts
- ♦ Non-emergency lines

Evacuation/Sheltering

♦ Do own personal risk assessment

- ♦ What hazard is more dangerous to you?
 - ♦ COVID-19 VERSES: Flood; Tornado; Fire; etc.
 - ♦ Use this assessment to create two sheltering options

♦ Take supplies:

- ♦ Mask; Hand Sanitizer; Wipes; Thermometer
- Other Disaster Go-Bag items

Emergency Preparedness

Fairfax County Emergency scenario #1

- □ CAT 2 hurricane (Cora) makes landfall in the NCR. The Storm causes power outages and cascading effects to critical infrastructure in the region, including communications, transportation, water/wastewater, and hospital systems.
- What would OEM do?
- What should OEM concerns be?
- How would OEM & DPSC coordinate this effort?

Emergency Preparedness

Fairfax County Emergency scenario #2

- □ Law Enforcement agencies in Washington, DC have confirmed an explosion has occurred on the National Mall in the vicinity of Constitution Ave. and 9th Street NW.
- □ Orders have been given to shelter in place, however, many people in the vicinity and beyond have begun to self evacuate out of the area.
- □ Reports of pedestrian foot traffic on roadways exiting the City have been confirmed.
- □ The District of Columbia Dept. of Transportation in coordination with the responding law enforcement agencies are requesting implementation and execution of the Evacuation Plan for a walkout evacuation.
- What would OEM do?
- What should OEM concerns be?
- How would OEM & DPSC coordinate this effort?
